You will need to know the birthdate and year of each person living in your home.

If you choose to take the census by phone or mail but need assistance, make sure you have a helper with you before you begin.

The U.S. Census is a headcount of every person living in the United States.

It happens every 10 years, with the next one beginning in April 2020.



What is it used for?

The census helps make decisions on how money will be used for public services like schools, housing, hospitals, healthcare, and many more important services we rely on every day.

Do I have to participate?

Everyone of any age living in the 50 states, District of Columbia and five U.S. territories is required by law to be counted in the census. By April 1, 2020, every home will have been notified and received instructions for participating.

Service members, people in correctional facilities and those who are currently homeless are also counted.



What will the census want to know?

The census will ask how many people are living in your home, along with the gender, age and race of each person.

Does it include a citizenship question?

The census will **NOT** ask about your citizenship status, nor are they allowed to.

How do I respond to the census?

You may choose to answer online, by phone, or by mail with a paper questionnaire. In addition to English, you can answer or get help in 12 other languages.

Will my data be secure?

The U.S. Census Bureau is legally **not allowed** to share your personal data with any government agency, law enforcement or landlord. Technology is in place to fully protect your privacy and security.

What if I need help filling out the census?

Staff at Capital Area District Libraries can help you fill out the census online. It's free to use library computers and internet service.
