We haven't had any patrons reach out regarding this, but we do have handouts and business cards from Michigan Legal Help in both English and Spanish that we can provide.

I'm also starting back up a 1:1 monthly service with a local immigration attorney in March. People can sign up for a free 30 minute appointment with an attorney and they get a private room to meet with the attorney here in the library.
