Meet Randall Davidson, composer/producer

Born in Pueblo, Colo., Randall Davidson studied with Dominick Argento, Eric Stokes, Susan McClary, and Paul Fetler at the U of Minnesota School of Music and with Alf Houkom, Olivier Messiaen, and Ned Rorem at Cornell College. He also trained with Sandy Goehr in London. He then settled in Minneapolis, devoting himself to composition. He was one of three founding members in the 1970s of the Minnesota Composers Forum.

Davidson's catalogue includes choral works, an opera, chamber and orchestral works as well as television commercials, incidental music for theater, a major sound installation to inaugurate the Minnesota Children's Museum, and music for rock, jazz, and wind ensembles. Davidson enjoyed a long collaborative relationship with the radio humorist and writer Garrison Keillor, composing such works as The Young Lutheran's Guide to the Orchestra and a humorous oratorio, The History of Evil: Bible Families. In addition, Davidson is a classically-trained cellist and self-trained improvisor with a preference for contemporary idioms and Renaissance music.

Davidson has served on boards of Meet the Composer and New Music USA, and president of the American Music Center. An educator and advocate throughout his career, Davidson presents lectures, seminars, workshops, panel discussions, and pre-concert talks.

Excited to join the discussion component as artist-curator, Randall Davidson aims to bring art into the picture to help us better understand the impact of past policies and future ideas on people's lives.

Randall Davidson will serve as artist-curator for the four fall C&B discussions.


