Here at Albion, we bought 5 of these. They are heavy duty, long and flexible for multiple wraps or locking siblings' bikes together. Folks come in to the desk to request a lock, and staff go out to lock it for them. Same with unlock. They each have a numbered label, and we have a cheat sheet of the lock codes on a sheet at the front desk with the item barcode to scan in (count use at unlock, not to the patron) for usage stats.
